Duffin Crossing!

Over recent years, new housing developments for older people have seen the number of elderly residents and users of a new day care centre rise to 250 in a small area either side of the road.

Donnington Partnership's community safety working group in partnership with Lilleshall & Donnington Parish Council, the Borough of Telford & Wrekin, Wrekin Housing Trust and Bromford Corinthian Housing Association have raised £60,000 over the past year to get the crossing put in place.

Local resident Mrs Sylvia Jones said: "I use the Puffin crossing on a very regular basis and feel a lot safer now than I used to when I am crossing the road".

Local Police Traffic Management Officer WPC Mickey Riggs said: "The Puffin Crossing operates in a similar way to a Pelican Crossing except that the red/green man indicator is positioned above the push button. This assists the pedestrian because they can see the traffic and the red/green man at the same time. The Puffin crossing also has detectors which will extend the time available for pedestrians to cross the road and a further set of detectors will cancel the demand for the crossing if the pedestrian moves away from the crossing area".

Operation Clean-Sweep - the results

You may remember back in May agencies in Donnington forged links to help spruce up the neighbourhood in a week-long operation entitled 'Operation Clean Sweep'.

The Donnington Partnership Neighbourhood Action Team, which includes Lilleshall and Donnington Parish Council, Telford Police, Borough of Telford & Wrekin, Wrekin Housing Trust, and local residents, decided to run the week long operation for a second time following a similar successful event last year.

Many agencies took part to tackle anti-social and environmental nuisance through environmental works and enforcement action and they also promoted awareness of ways to help members of the community keep their neighbourhoods clean, tidy and free from crime.

The results of this operation were vast and included graffiti and fly tipping removal, street cleaning, replacement of broken street signs, a tidy garden campaign by Wrekin Housing Trust, Asda collected over 50 abandoned trolleys, fire fighters from Shropshire Fire & Rescue Service visited homes to provide safety advice and education to residents and BT repainted their green cabinets. Wrekin Housing Trust staff patrolled their housing areas and visible Police foot patrols and CSO patrols occurred daily from 8am to 10pm in order to tackle anti social behaviour, nuisance and to increase public reassurance.

Police and enforcement activity resulted in: 42 motoring offences (varying degrees), 31 reports of anti social behaviour and 6 arrests. There was also action taken concerning truancy (10 cases), fly tipping & dumping (11), graffiti (4), trading standards visits (7), benefits fraud stop checks (12). Organisers of this operation were very pleased with the outcomes and the fact by joining services together in this way created a big visual impact with no one single agency bearing extra burden.

The Donnington Partnership and its individual partner agencies will be concentrating efforts on further reducing criminal damage and anti-social behaviour in the area as well as carrying out similar focused operations in the future.

Ugly Bug Carnival

A spectacular 'ugly bug' carnival procession, barbecue and guided walk took place on 4th September for local people to celebrate and enjoy new additions at Granville Country Park.

A group of young people from the Parish have been hard at work on designs for a new picnic bench for the park along with another group 'Access Granville' that have been busy making further improvements for users of the park over the past year.

The Telford & Wrekin arts team in partnership with the Green Wood Centre had worked with the young people since October 2004 who came up with the idea for the bench following walks in the park and a series of arts workshops. The winning design by Charmain Jackson was inspired by the dragonflies seen in the park and a 3D version was made in clay. People from the local community and the Donnington Partnership selected the designs at a working lunch back in March.

Further improvements in the park by the Access Granville group have been co-ordinated by Donnington Partnership. This project has been funded by 'Living Spaces', who provided a grant of £25,000 which has been used to make improvements to the canal basin area of Granville Country Park.

The celebrations for these additions at Granville Park included a colourful 'ugly bug' carnival procession from the Lifelong Learning Centre arriving at Granville Park to mark the occasion of the arrival of the 12ft bench and formally launch the improvements around the canal basin.

Children and young people from the area took part in the carnival preparations 3 days leading up to the event and procession on the day.

Councillor Clive Mason, council member for Donnington ward said: "The effort which has gone into the improvements at Granville Park has been amazing, we would like to say a big thank you to all those who took part, in particular, a huge thank you to Living Spaces for the funding which was received to help towards making these changes possible to the canal basin area of Granville Country park."

Donnington Highway Improvements

Councillors for Donnington have managed to secure an extra £70,000 for highway work to be carried out in the Donnington area. With this extra cash the following work will be carried out:

Church Walk – Footpath surfacing outside 38 to 60 and 1 to 23. Carriageway surfacing outside 26 to 32.

Baldwin Webb Avenue – Footpath surfacing outside 1 to 25

Turreff Avenue – Footpath outside 44 to library adjacent to 96 and 87 to 131. Carriageway surfacing outside 14 to 36.

New Timetable for Walkabout Wrekin

The successful Borough of Telford & Wrekin walking for health project – Walkabout Wrekin will shortly reveal its autumn/winter timetable.

So why not get active this autumn and join one of our walks – it's free, and good for you!

Walkabout Wrekin organises a number of led walks to get people up on their feet and out and about in the Borough.

The walking for health project promotes the benefits regular walking can bring to body, mind and soul.

All walks are led by trained walk leaders.

You can even become a walk leader yourself and lead others towards a healthier life as part of the Walkabout scheme.

Walk leader training takes place throughout the year.

The training programme includes information about the benefits of exercise, tips on motivating people to walk, talks on safety whilst walking and a First Aid qualification.

Special clothing is not required on the walks, but suitable footwear is recommended.

If you have not exercised for some time, or feel that you have a medical condition that may affect your ability, please consult a GP before going on the walk.

Joan of Muxton who is a dedicated Walkabout Walker said:

"Having heard about the Borough of Telford & Wrekin's organised 'walking for health' project, I arrived at Asda, Donnington to be greeted by the walk leaders of the day who introduced me to my fellow walkers.

I started off at the back with very 'wooden' legs and having to stop for a rest often (especially after up-hill exertion!)

"A year later, having progressed towards the front with the help and encouragement of fellow walkers and walk leaders, I feel that it has been very beneficial to me and a very pleasant way of meeting new people and making friends, which in turn has resulted in having a social evening at a restaurant twice a year.

Long may it continue!"

Jenny Stretton, Health Promotion Officer said:

"Due to the changes in the amount of light hours we have during autumn and winter the Walkabout Wrekin timetable will alter slightly.

The Asda walk will remain the same time and will include a 3 heart graded walk along with the 4 heart one.

But there are still walks at various times and venues.

"Walking is a great way to improve all-round health. Regular walkers are better able to maintain their weight, stay fit and well and enjoy good mental health.

They also have significantly reduced risks of coronary heart disease, strokes, diabetes, high blood pressure, bowel cancer, Alzheimer's disease, osteoporosis and arthritis".

Page 10 Introducing Sergeant Spencer



New Sergeant for Donnington Police Station

A new Police Sergeant has joined the policing team at Donnington and is determined to help crack down on violent crime and disorder.

Sergeant Barry Spencer joined the team last month and will be overseeing the Donnington, Donnington Wood, Muxton, Priorslee, St Georges, Oakengates, Trench, Ketley and Hadley areas.

Sergeant Spencer has worked across the Telford division for the last 13 years and has served at various stations, including Malinsgate, Wellington and Madeley.

So far, Sergeant Spencer has spent his time in Donnington getting to know his colleagues, residents and representatives from other agencies.

He said he was looking forward to rising to the challenge of working in Donnington.

He said:

"I have been getting to know my staff and some of the key people in other agencies, as well as councillors and residents.

"I have been trying to get out as much as I can so I can understand the areas and the problems people are facing."

One problem Sergeant Spencer has been made aware of and is keen to get to grips with, is violent

crime in Oakengates town centre.

A number of incidents have been reported in the area in recent months and in a bid to combat the problems, a variety of initiatives have been introduced.

Extra police patrols have been carried out and fines have been dished out to those misbehaving.

In addition, police are also looking at late licence applications and submitting objections where appropriate.

Sergeant Spencer added: "One issue that is of concern is violent crime in Oakengates town centre.

"Between midnight and 3am we have been experiencing some problems when people are leaving pubs and clubs. Some people have had too much to drink and incidents have occurred.

"We have carried out some high visibility operations and more will be carried out in the future.

"In addition, officers are being encouraged to issue fixed penalty notices to those who are misbehaving. People who receive a fixed penalty notice will have to pay a £80 fine.

"We want to ensure that people who go out to have a good time do not have their night spoiled by a few."

Sanitised Society?

How interesting that in his article in the last newsletter David Butterfield objected to the removal of religious symbols from crematoria and bibles from hospitals as sanitising society - using a word which originates from the Latin word for health sanitas - just as our word sane does as well.

For places of worship, the appropriate symbolism is of course important for inspiring the faithful, and in some public areas it may well be that a picture, sculpture or piece of music can be admired for its aesthetic value as well as forming a talking point for the ideas it represents.

However, the argument that we should have our religious symbols in full view in order to stimulate discussion and help us understand each other better really cannot be applied to places like hospitals and crematoria.

In hospital, when people are feeling unhappy and weakened, they look for comfort within their own sphere of belief.

And when families attend a crematorium, they have usually reached a time in their lives when they know very clearly what is meaningful and important to them and what is appropriate to honour the person who has died.

Many people today appreciate having the freedom to live good lives without the forced intervention of religion.

They have often reached an understanding of their life stance through a good deal of thought and discussion.

Let us by all means try without arrogance to achieve the goal of a sane, sanitised, healthy society, where there is respect and tolerance for those of all religions and those of none.

Grants from the Community Foundation

In addition to the Donnington Fair Share Trust Programme the Community Foundation for Shropshire and Telford offers the following grants for local voluntary organisations and community groups undertaking charitable work in Shropshire and Telford.

Sparkler Fund - £50 start up grants for embryonic Telford and Wrekin groups. Established by donations from Ironbridge Power Station's annual staff Bonfire Night.

General Grants Fund - made up of donations, from individuals, organisations and corporate bodies. Grants are made to voluntary organisations undertaking local charitable activity in the Telford and Wrekin area.

Care in the Community Fund - a restricted fund for Telford and Wrekin groups set up and supported with donations from the Telford & Wrekin Primary Care NHS Trust. Grants are for projects that assist groups working to support vulnerable adults at home and children in the community.

Local Network Fund for Children and Young People – offers grants throughout Shropshire and Telford. Groups are required to apply under one of four themes:

- Aspirations and Experiences
- Children's Voices
- Economic Disadvantage
- Isolation and Access

This fund invests in the work of local community and voluntary groups that provide local solutions to the problems of child poverty and disadvantage. The funding comes from a Government initiative administered by the Department for Education and Skills.

Connectivity Challenge - supported by the Goldsmith's Company. Grants are awarded for projects that bring groups from different communities from Shropshire and Telford together enabling them to learn from each other and share their experiences in a wider forum

Sport Relief – grants to groups helping people to reconnect with society through sport and exercise. The themes - Feeling or being left out; Having problems in your life; Groups that don't usually mix, provide a guide to project ideas.

In addition the Foundation administers the *Telford* and *Wrekin Mayoral Fund*, which supports voluntary work in Telford and Wrekin within the charities/themes chosen by the Mayor for his/her year of office.

Voluntary and community groups whose work in the Donnington and Lilleshall area could be assisted and enhanced with the help of a Community Foundation grant are urged to contact the Community Foundation office for further information and application forms.

Property Marking Labels









• WHAT ARE PROPERTY MARKING LABELS?

They are two-dimensional labels, the size of a normal postage stamp, which is covered in what looks like dots and blobs. However, within these dots and blobs will be encoded the number of the owner of the property they are on. The only way these labels can be read is with the use of specialised scanner, which only the police have access to.

HOW DO YOU USE PROPERTY MARKING LABELS?

Labels can be stuck to the rear of your household electrical items, such as TVs, DVD players, computers and on outdoor equipment such as pedal cycles, mowers, drills etc. The labels are protected with a clear 'overseal' strip which is provided. During the past 24 months, these labels have been issued to over 3,000 homes, schools and businesses in and around the Telford & Wrekin area. If every label is used, over 60,000 items of property is now marked with these labels. Each pack contains 20 labels and you also receive a checklist so that you can keep a record of where you have placed them. Normally there is a cost for these labels; however, the residents of Donnington and Lilleshall have the opportunity for the labels to be supplied FREE OF CHARGE as a special offer.
